Budget-priced so that it can be paid for from a teener's allowance, the new slicker is worn with a matching head-hugging cloche. It's done in a lightweight cloth that supplies supple texture and strength without weight. Color is in the coating, which is applied many times to make the fine percale sheeting completely waterproof.

This year, the slicker comes in classic yellow, bright red, pastel pink, sky blue and navy and includes sizes for everyone in the family.

Trim is in form of brass hookand-eye fasteners plus a black corduroy-lined collar.

In the 1920's, the well-loved slicker cracked and became tacky in no time at all. The 1954 slicker won't do this because machine oiling creates a uniform coating that keeps the fabric pliable and soft.


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
