Fabric Shades Can Be Washed Easily

Fabric lamp shades which are
stitched and not glued to the
frame may be washed, says
Magdaline Pfister, home furn-
ishings specialist at the Univer-
sity of Nebraska.

If the shade has colored trim-
mings, test to see whether the
color will run; if it does, remove
trimmings and wash separately.

Before washing, remove as
much surface dust as possible
with a soft brush. Plunge the
entire shade up and down into
thick suds made of synthetic de-
tergent or mild soap. Brush
gently with a brush. Rinse sev-
eral times in clear lukewarm
water. Dry quickly as possible
so that the frame will not rust
the material. A cord tied to
the cross wires of the shade is
helpful in hanging the shade.

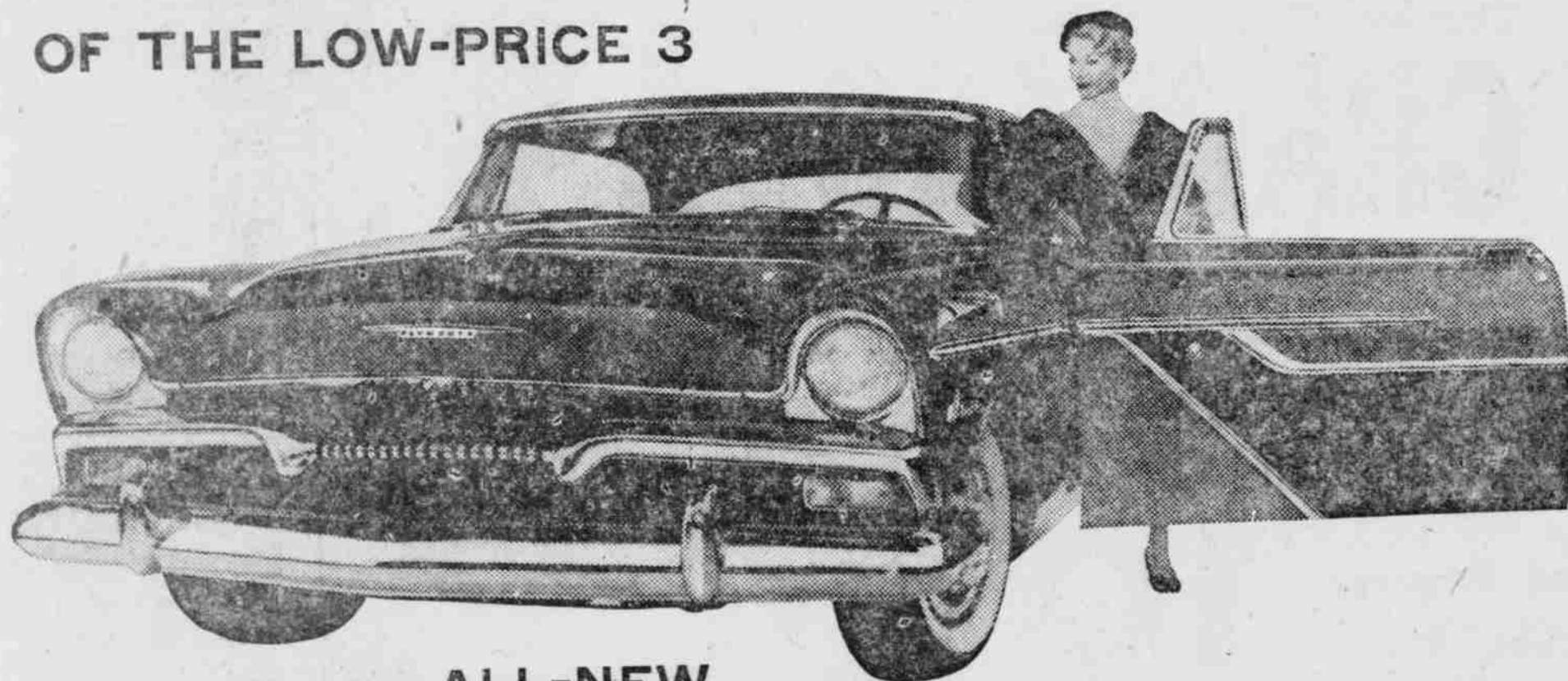

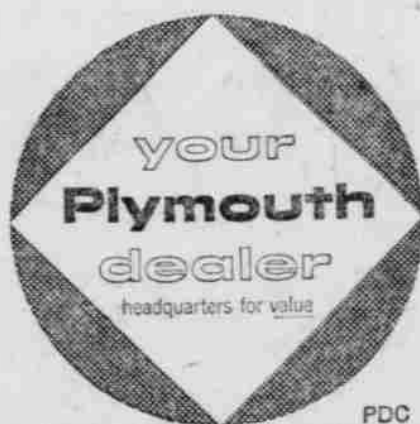
