The State Department Monday put 10 Nebraska counties off limits to Russians and Cass county was one of them.

Russian citizens may not travel in any of 895 counties in 39 states designated by the government according to the order.

braska are Cass, Douglas, Gage, Johnson, Lancaster, Nemaha, Otoe, Pawnee, Richardson and Sarpy. Two of the counties have large air bases. The Offut Air Force Base is in Sarpy

county just south of Omaha and Lincoln Air Force Base is in Lancaster county. However, Russian citizens may travel in both Omaha fact that both counties are off limits to them.
