Journal Ranks Among Top 10 In State Press

At the beginning of 1955, Nebraska newspapers were circulating to about 7,000 more readers than during the first days of 1954.

The Nebraska Press Association reported the 1955 figure at 942,963, compared with 935,889 in 1954 and 915,823 in 1953.

Weekly circulation totals 454,529 this year and was 454,953 a year ago. In 1953, it totaled 447,956.

Nebraska's population is estimated at 1,335,741; the number of families at 371,039.

The increase in circulation was made despite a decrease in the number of newspapers in the state. This year, there are 286 weekly and daily newspapers, eight less than a year ago. There are now 265 weekly and 21 daily newspapers in Nebraska.

Seven weekly newspapers and one daily newspaper suspended publication in 1954. They were the Bancroft Blade, Daykin Herald, Diller Record, Ewning Advocate, Omaha Post-Snyder Banner, Wallace Winner, weeklies, and the Auburn Tribune, a daily. The Ruskin News announced it

will be issued monthly in 1955.

Newspapers now publishing three times a week are the Cozad Local Omaha Tribune and Sidney Telegraph. Weeklies publishing twice a

week are the Broken Bow Custer County Chief, Lexington Dawson County Herald, Ogallala Keith County News, Plattsmouth Journal, and the Red Cloud Commercial Advertiser.

The largest weekly in the state is the Custer County Chief with 5,933 subscribers.

Other weeklies in the top 10 circulation list include the Wahoo Newspaper, Sidney Telegraph, David City Banner Press, Waterloo Gazette, Geneva Signal, Auburn Herald, Auburn Press Tribune, Plattsmouth Journal and the Ord Quiz.

Sixty-nine papers increased their advertising rates in 1954. A total of 25 papers altered their policy on liquor advertising for 1955. Six have discontinued all types of liquor advertising and three are taking the ads for the first time.

The McCook Reporter began a Sunday edition on Dec. 19, the only Nebraska newspaper to begin Sunday publication in 1954.
