Labor Supply Up In Area for '54

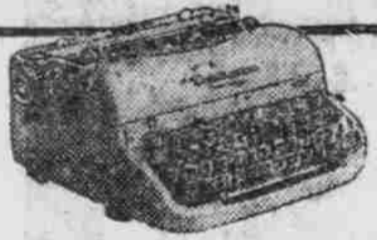
All counties in the Nebraska City, Falls City, Plattsmouth area, experienced increased labor supplies during the past six months according to a report by the Nebraska State Employment Service. Seasonal increases in the labor supply brought the year and total to 580 compared to 544 last year.

The supply of counties was Otoe 213 men, 50 women; Richardson, 95 men, 41 women; Cass, 86 men, 26 women; Nemaha, 48 men, 1 woman; and Johnson 15 men, 5 women.

Plattsmouth and Cass county activities included employer orders for 20 workers; 22 jobs filled; 49 new applications for work; 34 persons directed to job openings; and 266 contacts with the employment office for service. The yearly total of jobs filled in 1954 was 565 compared to 466 in 1953.

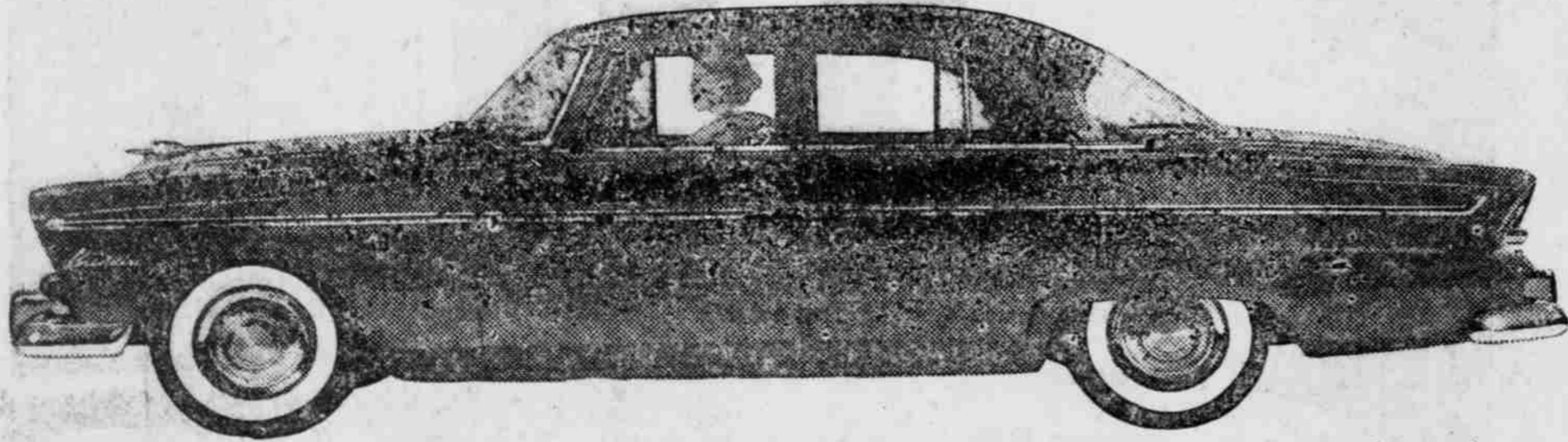

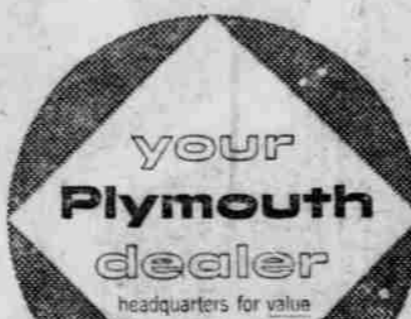
