He is E. O. Vroman who served 15 consecutive years on the Plattsmouth council, and after being out a short one term, his 16th year after election in 1952.

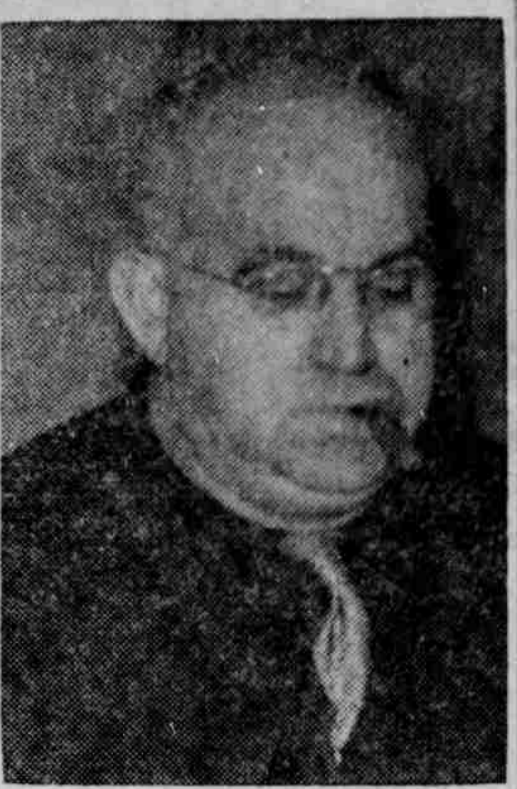
His father, the late L. E. Vroman, served 20 years on the council.

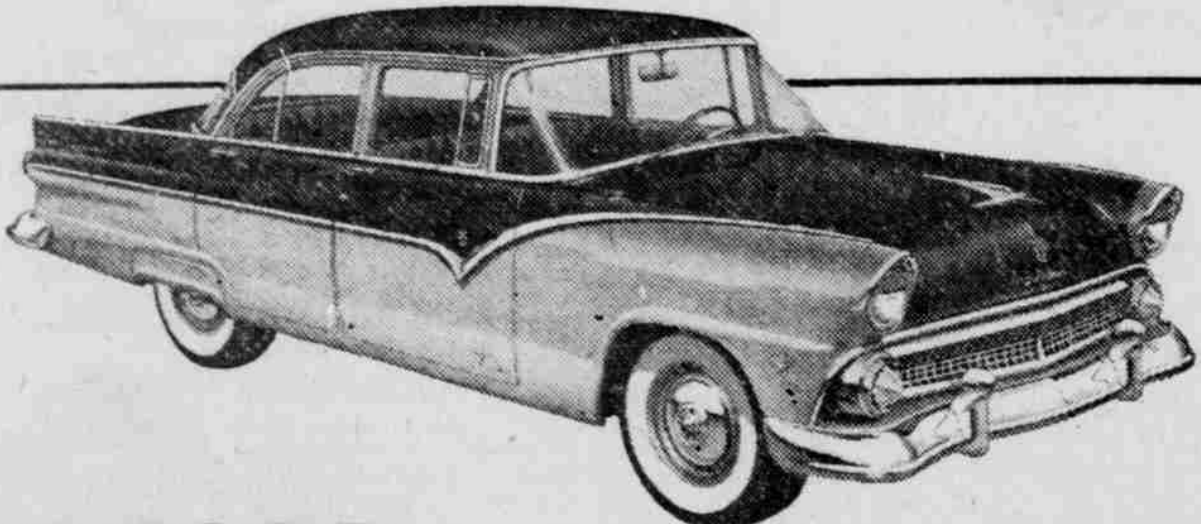
