Murphy who this year was elected president of the Blackwell Weldandy company of St. Louis. Mr. Murphy was born in Plattsmouth on May 28, 1892, and grew up here before going off to spend two years with the sec-

ond Army of Cuban pacification in 1907 and 1908 at the age of 15. He finished school in Chicago and became a traveling accountant until 1917 when he entered World War I and was with Headquarters, 85th Division in France. He entered the employ of the Blackwell Weldandy company in 1920 at St. Louis and was elected to the board of directors in 1936. He became vice president in 1941. He was one of the founders of the national organization known as The Printing Industry of America.
