Consumers Users Set All-Time High
Electric customers of Consumers Public Power District established an all-time high in the use of electricity, according to the District's Annual Report for the year 1954 which has just been released. The new record of 682,740,321 in kilowatt-hour sales by the District constitutes a 6.6% increase in this category over 1953. Helping to establish this new record is the fact that the number of customers served by Consumers Public Power District also increased over 1953, to a new high of 113,799. Residential customers, according to the report, upped their average, annual use 7.9% over the preceding year, to 2,401 kilowatt-hours per customer. The average kilowatt-hour cost to these customers declined slightly from 2.78 cents in 1953 to 2.71 cents. Commercial, industrial and rural uses of electricity also showed substantial gains throughout the year.
