Fishing Reported Poor in the West

LINCOLN — Fishing throughout the state has been poor, with the exception of the extreme eastern part. Game Commission reports indicate windy and cool weather has hindered the fishing.

Trout fishing in the western part of the state was the trout fishing at Chadron reservoir and White river. Worms and salmon were hitting good, particularly on artificial lures.

Trout fishing also has been good at the Fremont lakes with a limit being taken by Mr. and Mrs. John McKulsky of 4113 So. 20th St., Omaha. The largest was a 2½ pound rainbow.

Some streams in the eastern part of the state have produced good catfish and carp catches. Notable among these waters was the Elkhorn, Platte, and the Missouri rivers. Sardpit lakes in Fremont-Omaha area have been producing good bass fishing.

Fishing in the extreme northern part of the state near the junction of the Niobrara and Missouri rivers was excellent. Walleye, crappie, bluegill, catfish and carp fishing was good in both rivers. Although the water level was low all species were hitting good, particularly on artificial lures.

A bright spot in the western part of the state was the trout fishing at Chadron reservoir and White river. Worms and salmon were hitting good, particularly on artificial lures.

eggs were the most successful baits used there. Fishing in the southeastern part of the state picked up shortly after the recent rains. As the water level of the streams subsided, the fishing success dropped sharply. Some catfish are being caught near the Guide Rock diversion dam, but there have been no reports of exceptionally large catches.
