Fourteen members were present and three guests, Mrs. Hubert Roddy, Mrs. Carl Wessel and Mrs. Maggie Everett.

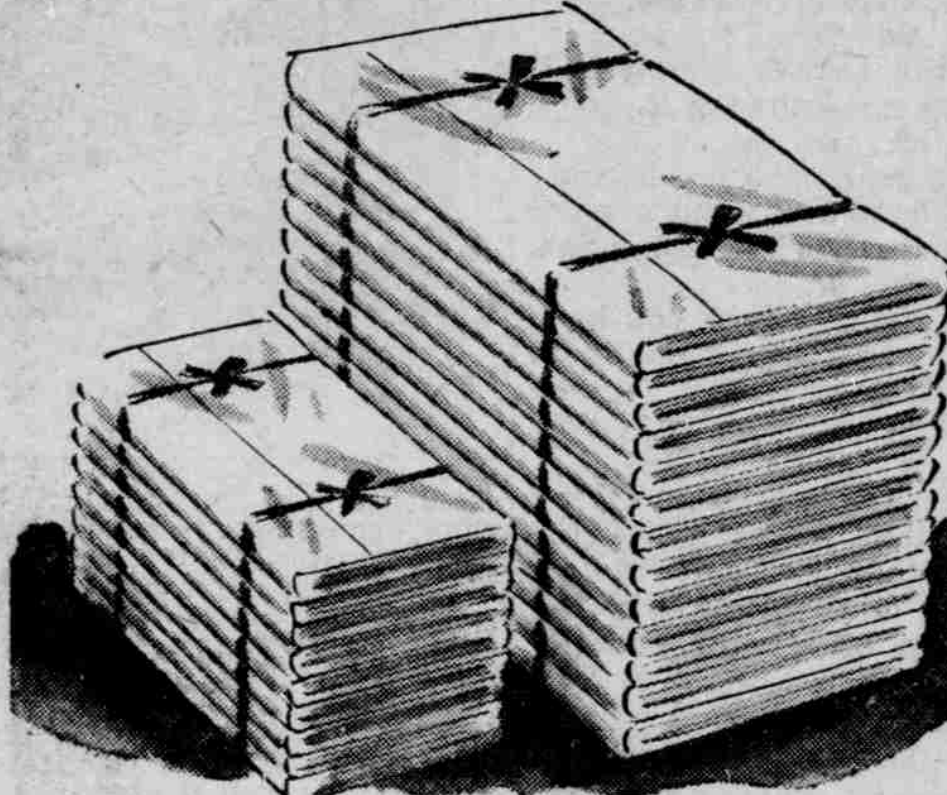
