57 Per Cent Quota Made on Bond Sale
Walter H. Smith, Cass county savings bond chairman, announced this week that sales of series E and H United States savings bonds for the month of August amounted to \$9142.50. This brings the total county sales of these securities for the January-August period to \$661,443.75 and represents 57 per cent of the county's 1955 quota.

The county chairman also announced that E and H savings bonds sales for the entire state during August amounted to \$7,847,859. This is the highest that August sales have been since the end of World War II, he said. Nebraska's eight-month total sales for the year reached \$75,805,546, representing 67% of the 1955 quota. Nebraska's 8-month total was the second highest in the past 10 years, the county chairman stated.
