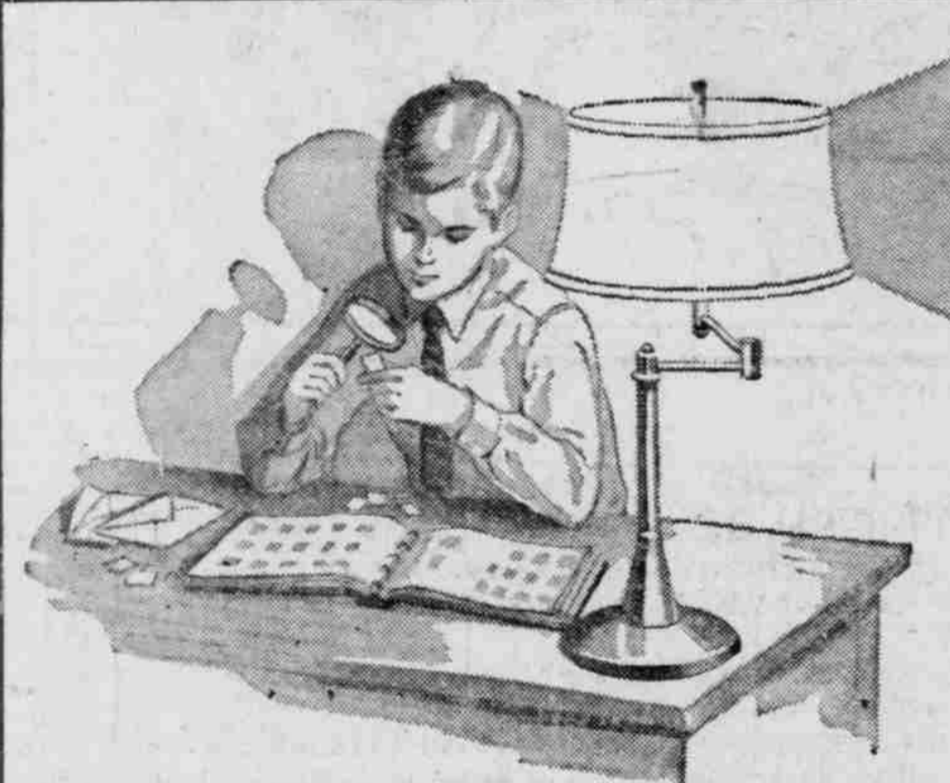
Center Club Picnic
