Legion Presents Toys to Blind

Last Thursday evening, several Legionnaires, representing American Legion Post No. 237, went to Nebraska City, taking with them over \$100 worth of toys which they presented to the Nebraska State School for the Blind.

One of the Legionnaires reported that "a greater joy he never had as he saw the excitement in the faces of these children as they received these much needed toys."

Upon learning this need for recreational toys at the state sponsored school, the Weeping Water post spearheaded an American Legion District 12 drive for toys. Other posts in the district which includes several southeastern counties are

planning toy drives. The American Legion received a substantial discount on these toys from Gambles Store and Michelsen's.

Jerry Regler, superintendent of the Nebraska School for the Blind, related that the school has 30 students between the ages of five and ten that are dependent on a few, old broken toys for recreational purposes. He also said that that figure was to be about 40 in the year 1936.

These children coming from all over Nebraska and two from Wyoming, seldom get home except on Easter and Christmas vacations. —Weeping Water—

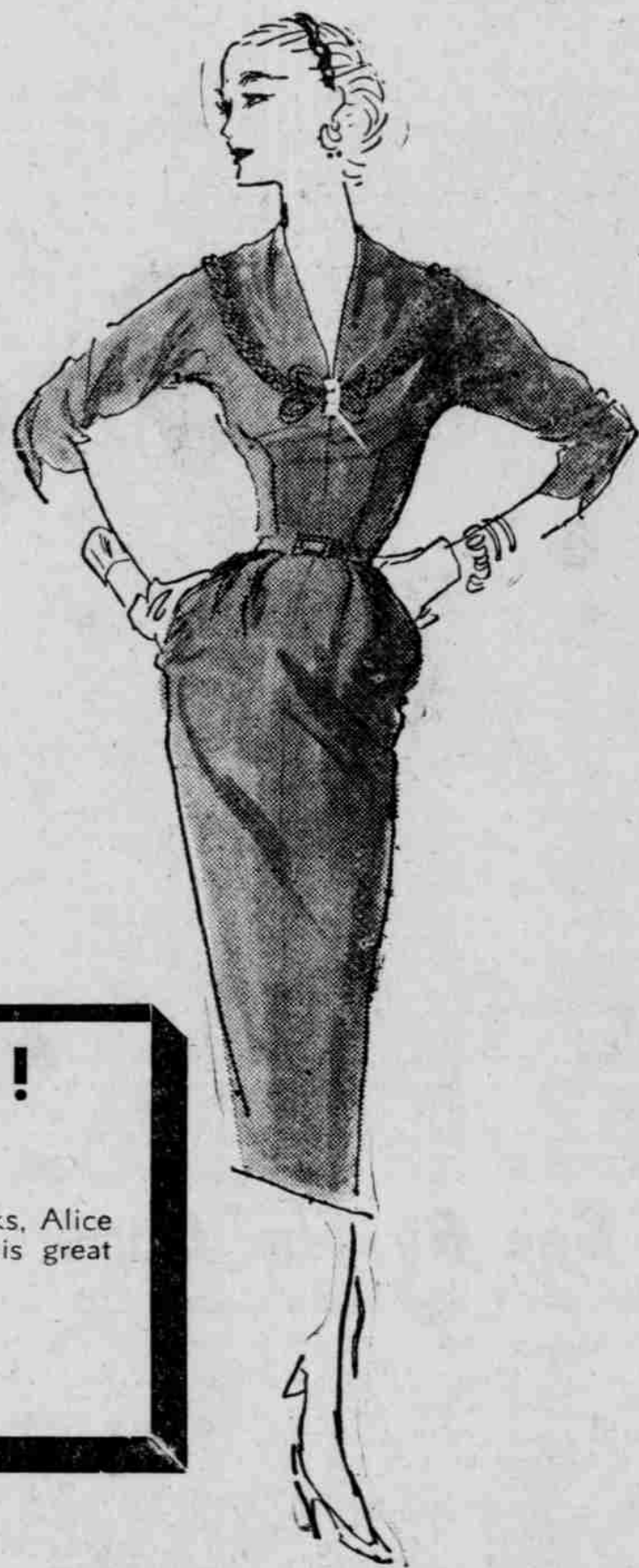
