West Germany started its new army as the first 101 members of the armed forces received their certificates of appointment from Minister Blank.

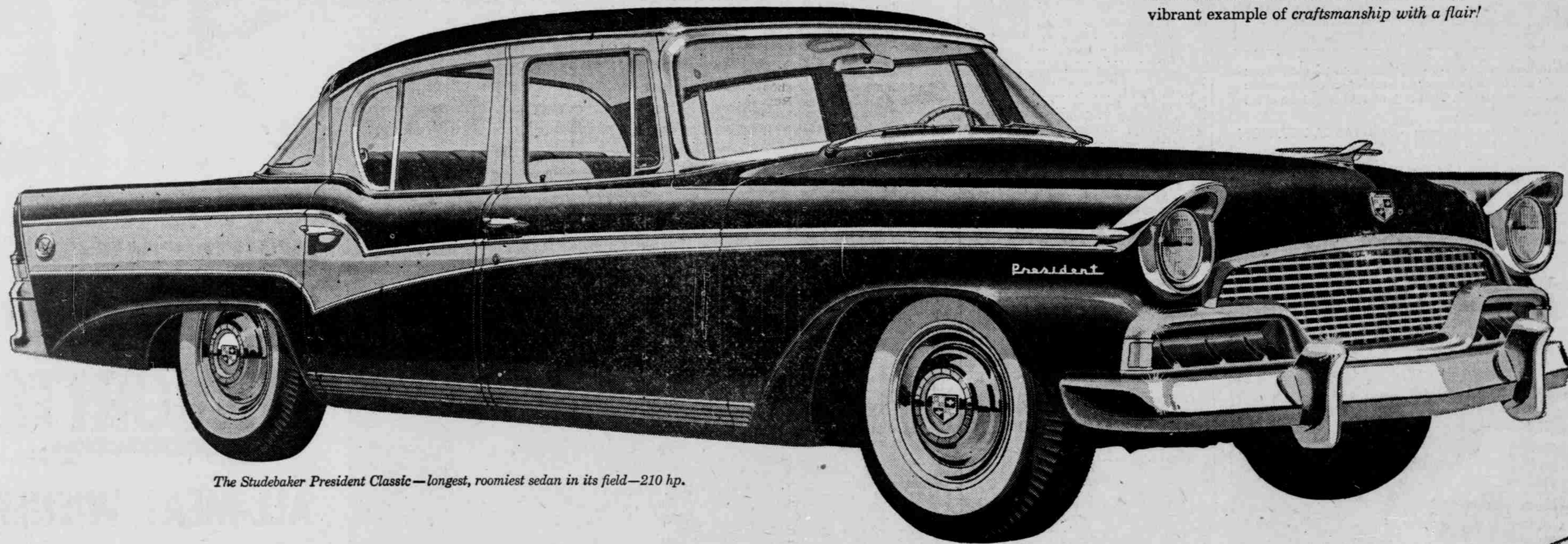
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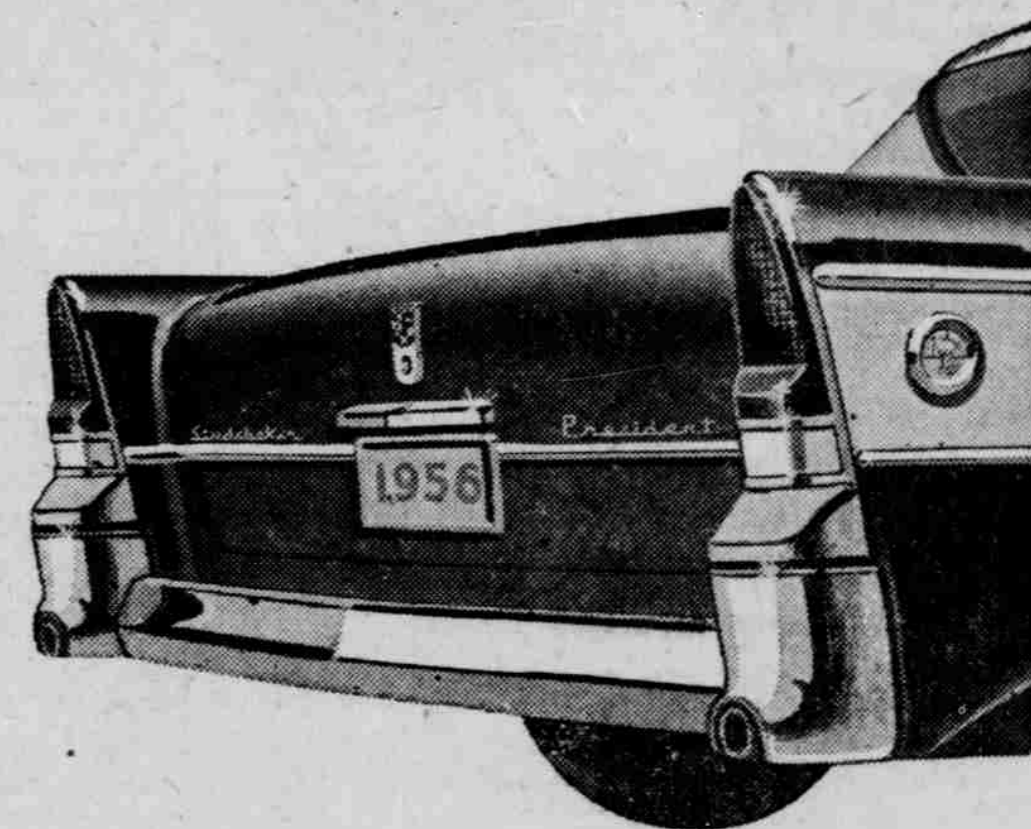
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
