

Carl Willett of Plattsmouth Featured in Chemical Paper

Featured in a three page spread in the March issue of Nitrogen Division Life, publication of Allied Chemical and Dye Corp., north of Plattsmouth is Carl Willett of Plattsmouth, a maintenance foreman.

In late 1955, the Willetts, Carl his wife Ruth and two children Steve, 7, and Linda, 5, moved into their new home in Valley View section. Fifteen other division families live in the same section.

During the first year of the Willett's marriage, Carl worked as a pipefitter, class B, advancing to class A, in 1948. Five years later, in 1953, the division transferred him to Marietta, Ohio, as an inspector on construction.

The local nitrogen plant was under way then and Marietta's Dravo Corp. was making steel pipe for the new plant. As an inspector, it was his job to inspect that pipe making sure it would withstand the necessary working pressures. After five months at Dravo, he was transferred to the Allied plant as an inspector for all piping to be used in the fledgling plant. It was then early in 1954. One month later Carl Willett was promoted to maintenance foreman.

When Carl made his first step into supervision, he was following the pattern of the division's policy of promotion from within. Since July 1, 1952, when the di-

vision was formed, there has been a parade of men moving into supervisory positions from the ranks of hourly jobs like Carl.

Carl's responsibilities don't leave him much time. For instance, every six weeks he goes on a 24-hour call basis for seven days. Training and employee relations are a part of his responsibilities. When a plant shutdown comes, he must be ready beforehand. He must check and recheck to make sure that his men know just what they are to do so production loss will be held to a scant minimum.

If one of the plant's steam lines leak—a hole no larger than a pinhead. A lot of steam can get through a small hole under 450 pounds of pressure. How serious is the leak? Could temporary repairs adequately stem the escaping steam until a scheduled shutdown allowed time to fix it permanently? Could those repairs wait until the 8 a.m. shift reported in? Such are the questions that are fired through the mind of foremen like Carl Willett when they are on the job—and the answers they must know, whether they are at work or called from a deep sleep at home.
