After driving across the Plattsmouth Bridge into Iowa Mink told investigators he lost control of the car at about 75 miles an hour and it rolled over three times.

The men went across a field to a farmhouse and obtained a ride back to Plattsmouth from the farmer.

The sheriff said the men failed to inform Mr. Timm they had wrecked his car. Instead they said they decided to forget the incident, Sheriff Solomon said.
