

School Board OK's Purchase Of New Desks

The purchase of 188 new grade and high school desks were authorized by the Plattsmouth Board of Education during its regular monthly meeting Monday evening.

The new desks will cost \$4,096 and will be purchased from the Hoover Brothers Company of Omaha.

The purchase of three new teachers' desks were approved also at a total cost of \$166.

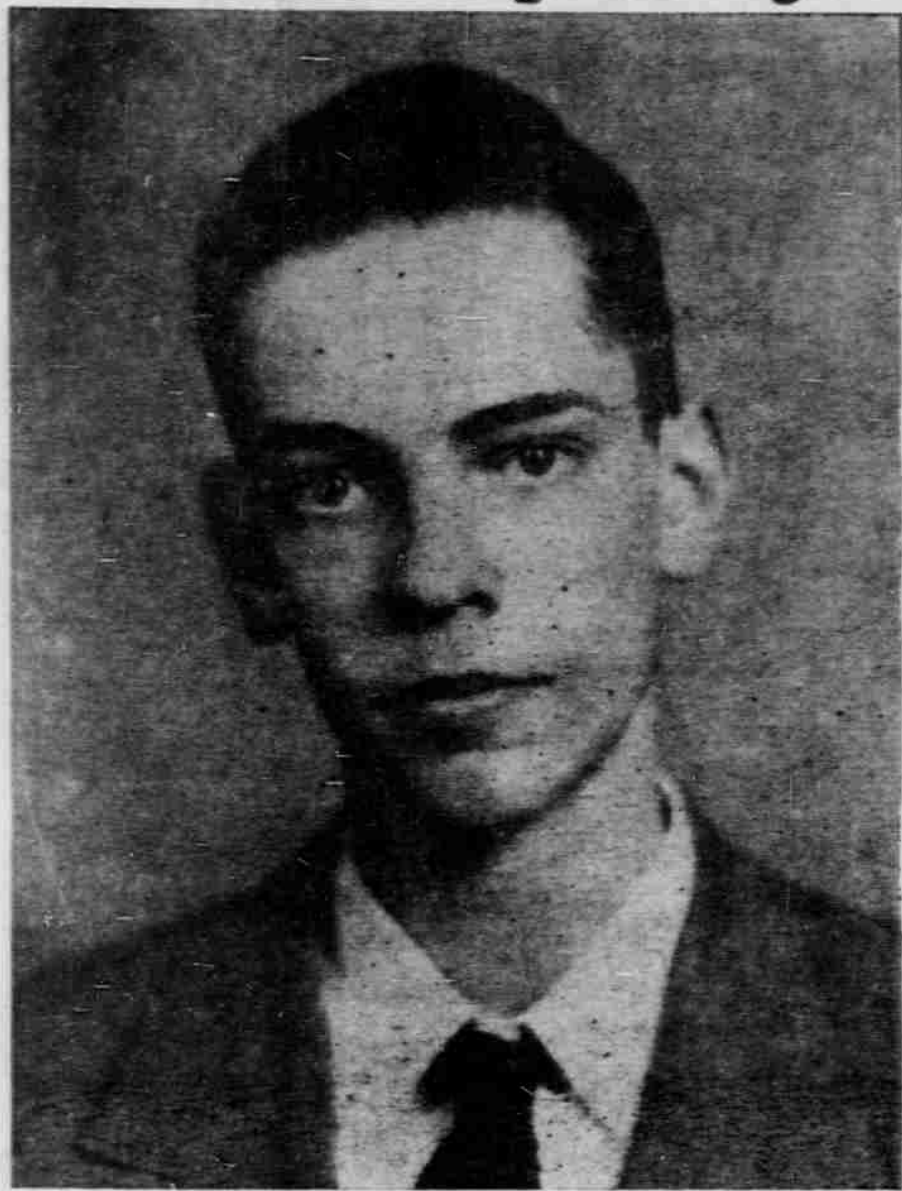
Also under discussion at the meeting was the installation of a public address system for the high school auditorium. Ray Herold of Ray's TV Service advised the board on the cost of such a system and the equipment he felt would be needed. He estimated the cost at \$536.

A recommendation to raise the wages of several school janitors was brought up, but no definite decisions were reached.

A letter of resignation from Marilyn Lutz was read by Secretary Dean Dunham. The letter was approved by the board and the resignation accepted.

Miss Lutz plans to return to the University of Nebraska to complete work for a degree. Miss Lutz was with the local school system for five years and was kindergarten teacher and assistant principal at Central School.
