

City Schools Continue on Select List

The Plattsmouth City School System is unqualifiedly continued on the list of Class A accredited schools, according to a letter received by Superintendent T. I. Friest recently.

Mr. Friest said the letter was from Floyd A. Miller, secretary of the State Accreditation Committee.

It was addressed to the president of the Board of Education and superintendent of city schools and read as follows:

"It is with real satisfaction that we inform you that the Plattsmouth City School System has been unqualifiedly continued on the list of Class A Accredited Schools for the ensuing year, July 1, 1956-June 30, 1957, by the State Accreditation Committee. This action was taken at the meeting of the committee in Lincoln on May 14, 1956.

Members of the State Accreditation Committee and the Department of Education wish to express their appreciation of the cooperative spirit of Superintendents and Boards of Education in the common endeavor to improve educational opportunities for the boys and girls of Nebraska."
