

Miss Range Is Delegate To National FHA Meet

Sharon Range, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Maynard Range of Plattsmouth, will be a delegate to the 1956 national convention of Future Homemakers of America, July 2 to 6, at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago, Ill.

A senior at Plattsmouth High School, Miss Range has been a FHA member since 1953 and has served as chapter president, vice president, treasurer and also district secretary and state secretary.

Advisor for the local chapter is Miss Lynas Schwendemann. FHA is the national organization of pupils studying homemaking in junior and senior high schools in the United States and the territories. Any student who has taken or is taking homemaking may belong to the organization. Membership is voluntary. National membership totals nearly 500,000.

FHA is sponsored by the American Home Economics Association and the United States Office of Education. Cooperating groups are the home economics sections of the American Vocational Association and the National Education Association. The main goal of FHA is to learn to live better today in order that the homemaking pupils' lives and those of their families may be better tomorrow.

Convention sessions will be geared to helping FHA'ers recognize opportunities and accept responsibilities related to improving home, school and community life.

Other activities during the

five day gathering include election of 1956-57 national officers and voting on national projects.

Miss Range is one among 2,000 FHA members chosen to attend the national meeting. She will join other delegates and leave for Chicago from Lincoln Sunday.

Sharon also is a member of the following school and community organizations:

National Honor Society, Plattsmouth staff, annual staff, marshal of Jobs Daughters, Sunday school secretary and pianist, youth fellowship and a member of the Mynard Evangelical United Brethren Church choir.
