

Refreshments were served in the basement by Mrs. Pike, Mrs. Cross and Mrs. Clarence.

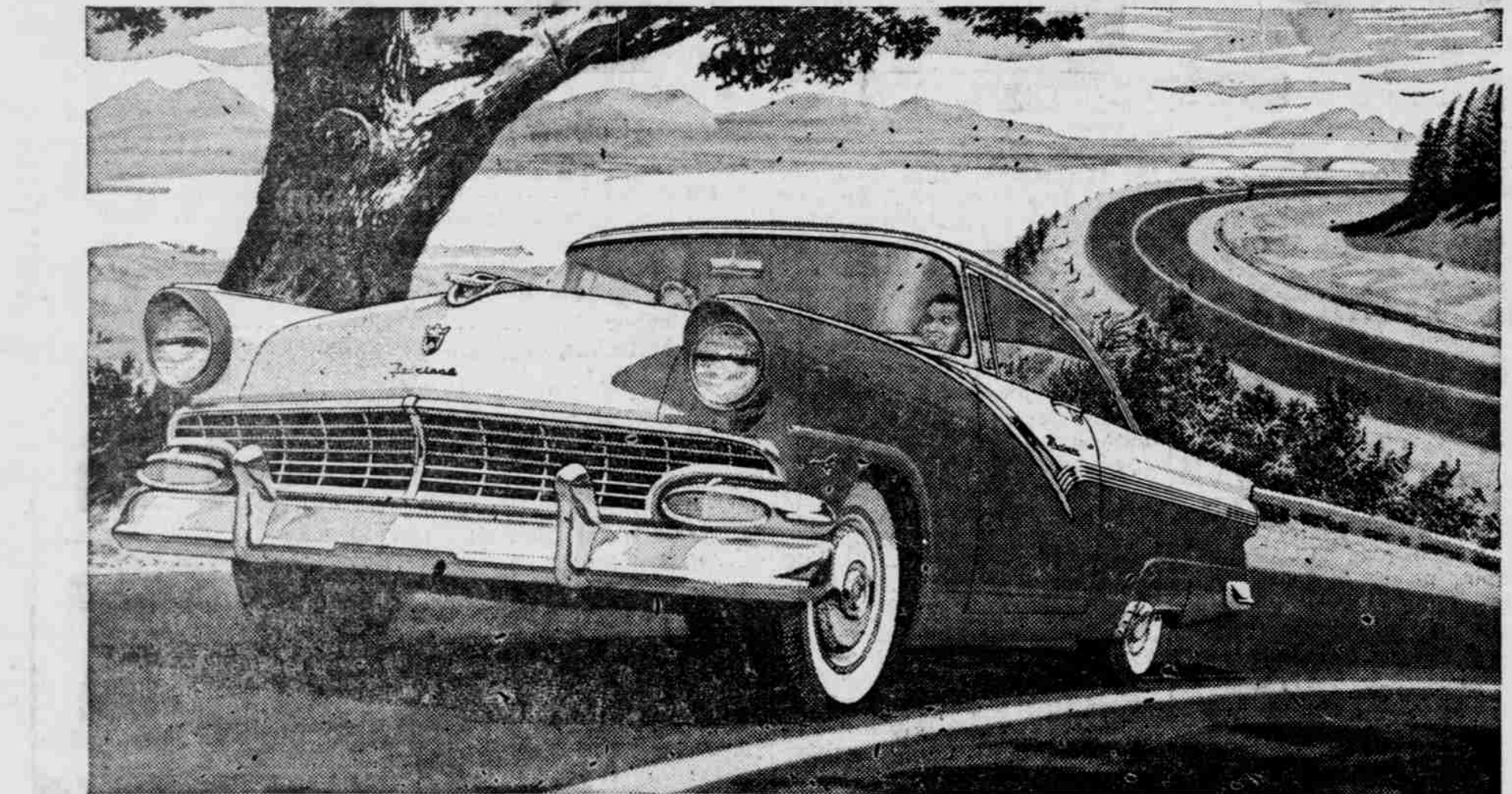
