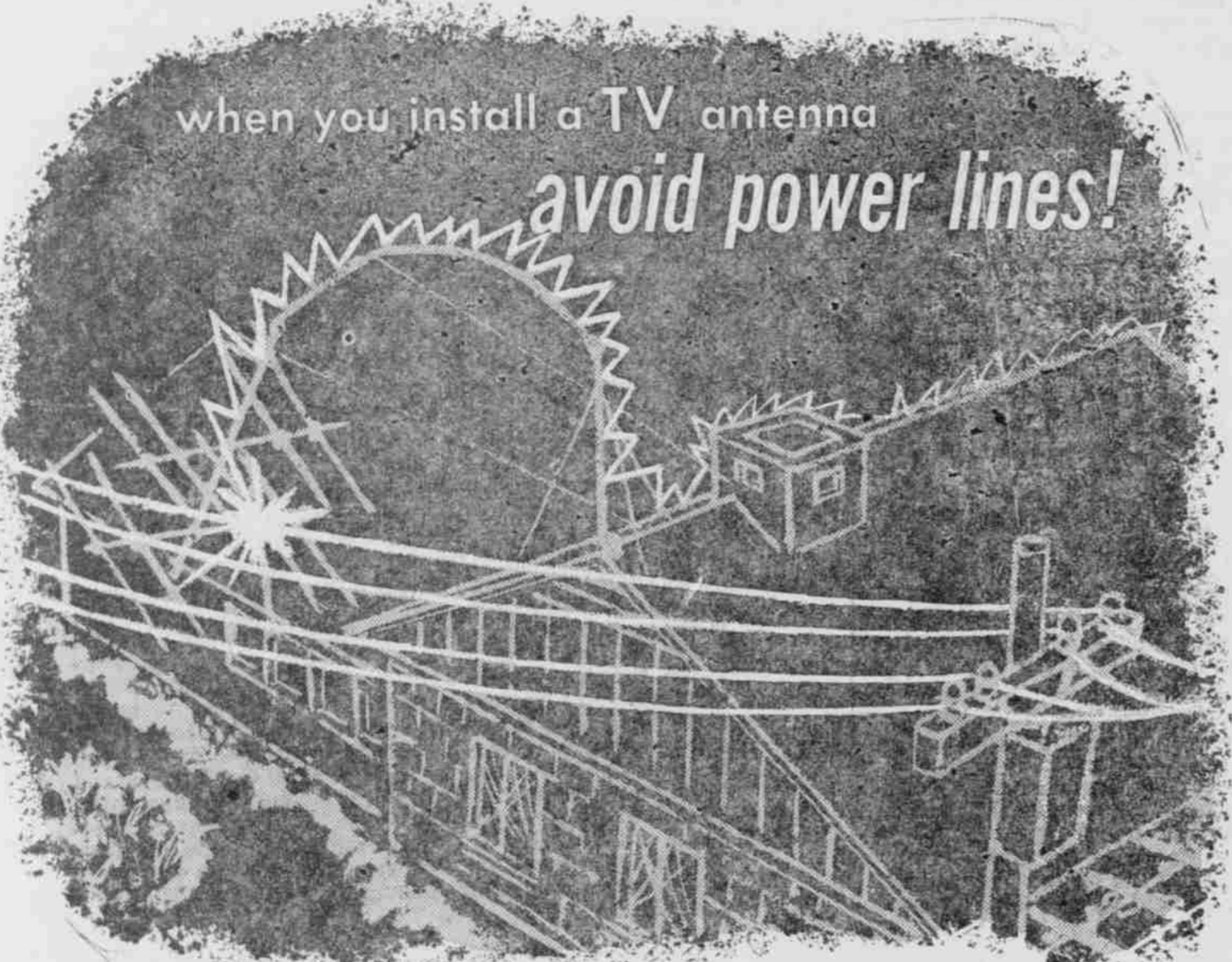

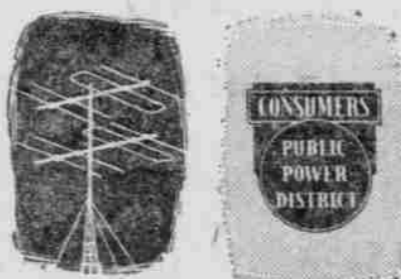
Electricity, enough to kill, can flow through any metal or other conducting material that touches high-voltage lines. It can even flow through wood. Should a tall, top-heavy TV antenna fall across a power line, the mast and guide wires become energized and are then potential killers and conductors of fire.

If you have a new house and are about to set up an outside TV antenna, make sure that should it ever topple that it would not fall across power lines. If you have a TV antenna atop your house now and you have a question relative to its nearness to a power line, please call your power office for advice.

in case of accident...

If an accident does happen, never touch a person or equipment in contact with a power line. A dry board or dry rope may be used to pull anyone free from contact. Give first aid and call a doctor at once. Call the power office right away—and tell them what happened and where it happened.
