**MINUTES OF SPECIAL
 MEETING OF THE VILLAGE
 OF ELMWOOD, NEBRASKA**
 The Chairman and Board of
 Trustees of the Village of Elm-
 wood, Nebraska, met in a special
 meeting on the 26th day of July,
 1956, at 7:30 o'clock P. M. at the
 Clerk's Office in the Fire House
 in said village in accordance
 with the notice duly served upon
 the members of said board.

The meeting was called to or-
 der by the Chairman and on roll
 call the following answered as
 being present: Chairman Omar
 Bornemeier, Trustees: Rodney
 Whittemore, Frank Turner, C. R.
 Rueter; Village Clerk Richard
 Engles. Absent None. Also pres-
 ent W. W. Nuernberger, special
 attorney for the Village on said
 sewer system. Willard Opocen-
 sky, special engineer, was pres-
 ent.

The Chairman stated the pur-
 pose of the meeting was to con-
 sider the proposed resolution or-
 dering construction of the sani-
 tary sewer system in the Village
 of Elmwood, Nebraska, and to
 provide for the proper notice to

 read by the Village Clerk, Rich-
 ard Engles.

IT WAS MOVED by Trustee C.

 read.

The Chairman stated the mo-

 call the roll. The roll call re-

 To 3 Offutt Airmen**

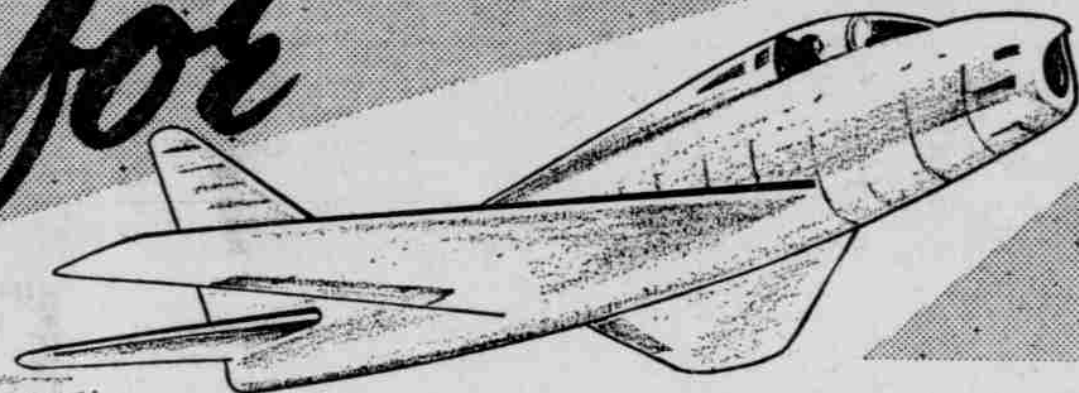
Three youths from Offutt Air
