the equipment the department now has is insufficient and nearly worn out.

The council suggested Mr. Kruntorad determine the quantity and quality of the equipment needed and report his findings to the next meeting.

A plan for constructing a water reservoir storage tank was presented by Bob Cappell, head of the water department here.

The council several months ago authorized the department to cover the open reservoir east of town, however, Mr. Cappell said a tank would be more efficient and would also be far cheaper.

The estimated cost for covering is \$50,000, but the tank would cost only about \$28,000.

The water department was authorized to let bids for the tank's construction.

Also discussed was a proposal to construct sewerage facilities in the vicinity of Sixteenth Street and Avenue C. The discussion on this point will be resumed at the next meeting of the council, August 27.
