During the past year accidents laimed the lives of over 14,000 farm people in the United States. Of that number, 3800 were the result of farm work accidents and another 3500 were killed in the farm home.

"National Farm Safety Week College of Agriculture is an ideal time to plan your personal and family safety for the coming year," Lutes said.


