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Trailer Home, Court Law Called 'Void'

An Oct. 1 official opinion from the Attorney General of Nebraska has led to a notice from the chief of the Bureau of Dairies and Foods that "LB 104 is void and unenforceable in its entire-

The law, also known as the Mobile Homes and Mobile Home Courts Law, was passed by the 1957 legislature. It was to regulate trailer homes and courts.

The bureau chief gave no explanation in his notice to county clerks but Atty. Gen. Gerald Vitamvas has been quoted saying that by exempting courts already in existance, the law violates the state constitutional provision which prohibits the passing of any special laws granting to any corporation, association or individual any special or exclusive privileges, immunity or franchise.

The law called for licensing and inspection of trailer courts by the State Agriculture Department and established penalties for violations. A \$10 permit for construction, \$25 initial license fee to operate a trailer court and \$25 annual license fee were pro-
