Corn May Be Supported

LINCOLN - Corn produced on farms that have not compiled with 1957 farm corn allotments will be eligible for price support, states Wilfred Nelson, chairman of the Nebraska Agricultural Stablization tury, died this noon at Bryan and Conservation committee.

The local price-support rate based on a national average of \$1.10 per bushel. The national average price support for corn pending. from farms which have produced corn within the farm allotments had previously been announced at \$1.36 a bushel.

The law provides that if price support is provided for noncompliance corn in the commercial corn area, the support available outside the commercial area is to be at 70 per cent of parity. Therefore, the price support rate for 1957-crop corn is non-commercial areas will average 70 per cent of parity.
