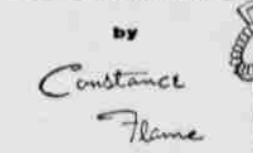
Humming Blue Birds

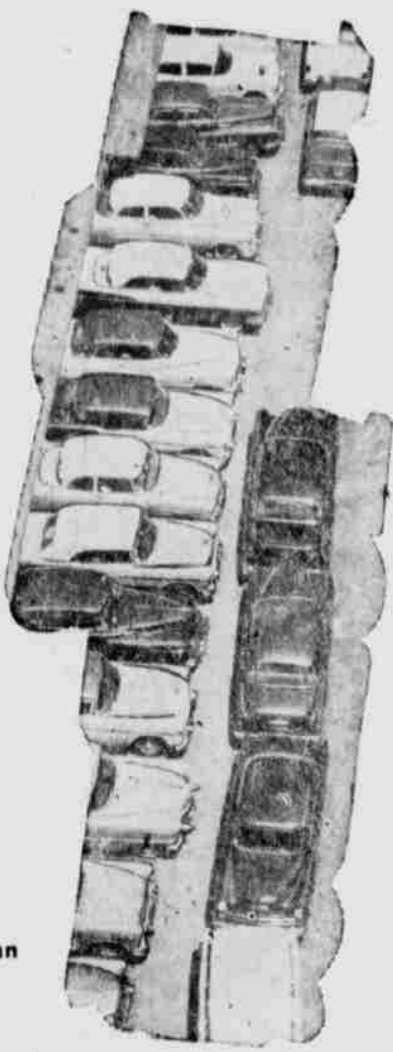

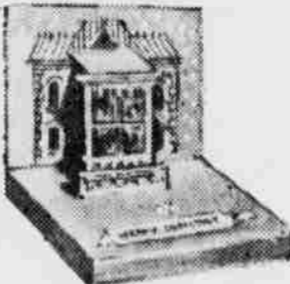
