Weeping Water Beats Omaha 5

WEEPING WATER—Weeping Water outscored Omaha Sacred Heart by a 2-1 margin after leading by only 11-10 at the end of the first quarter and won, 62-35, here Tuesday night.

Mike Stacey led Weeping Water with 16 points. Gary McDonald and Rick Applegate got 10 each.

Other quarter scores favored Weeping Water 29-17, and 41-23.

Carsten's 29 Lead Avoca's 74-49 Victory

AVOCA—Avoca won its 8th basketball game in 12 this season here Tuesday night and continued its high-scoring spurge which reached 153 points for two games.

Tuesday's score was; Avoca 74, Dunbar 49.

Carroll Carsten, a 6-4 center, poured in 29 points for the county's top individual effort of the season. Three teammates tallied in double figures, R. Marquardt 14 getting 14 and W. Wohlers and G. Bose 11 each.

Avoca's 28-point second quarter is one of the top quarter counts ever recorded by a county team. It came after Dunbar had played "control" ball for a 9-8 first quarter lead. Avoca got 20 points each in the third and fourth quarters.

Avoca won the reserve game, 37-14, with P. Tritsch leading with 11 points. Avoca's seconds are 7-2 for the season.

At volleyball, Avoca won 2 out of 3 games for an 8-5 record.

Blue Devils vs. Pawnee, Westside vs. Wahoo Tonite

It's Plattsmouth vs. Pawnee City at 8:15 and Westside vs. Wahoo at 8:30 at Bellevue tonight in semifinals of the Ak-Sar-Ben Conference basketball tournament.

Should top-seeded Plattsmouth and Westside come through tonight they'll meet in a rematch in the title game Friday at 8:15. Reserves of the finalists play at 6:30 Friday.

Earlier this season, Westside defeated Plattsmouth here, 45-35, in a game which was decided in the closing minutes.

But, Plattsmouth faces another rematch before it can consider what might happen Friday night. At Pawnee City Jan. 10, the Blue Devils were pressured to the end to win, 52-47.

Plattsmouth reached the semis by downing Bellevue, 46-32, and Ashland, 61-44. Westside beat Auburn, 61-57, and Blair, 62-24.

Pawnee City was a 52-34 winner over Tecumseh and Wahoo a 69-45 victor over Ralston.

The team's all-around effort was one of the best despite the fact that the game tended to be ragged at times.

Plattsmouth's 24-point fourth quarter was its biggest single-quarter output this season.

And, the recently installed double pivot worked its best yet when it pulled the Blue Devils out of a momentary slump in the third quarter and got them set for the big push in the fourth.

J. C. Draper, half the double pivot, led the Plattsmouth scoring with 15 and Jim Shown had 14 to continue his good scoring. Tom Martin, the other center, got 12 as did guard Ken Dasher.

Forward Bill Long who got a Charley horse Tuesday was still limping and didn't play.

A Real Hard Luck Victim Wednesday

Norman B. Goff and Herbert Wilson Sharp Jr., of Nebraska City, Wednesday were here to appear in the municipal court on a charge of illegal possession of liquor by minors before Judge J. H. Graves. They received fines of \$25 and costs each.

Goff was a real hard luck victim of the deal, driving his car up here to face the court, then having his car damaged as it was parked near the police station.

Doyle Foster's car was parked in front of the postoffice, the rear window of the car obscured by the heavy frost, and as he backed the car across the street he struck the car of Mr. Goff.

Damage to the car of Goff was estimated by police to be \$75 and to the Foster \$50 to \$75.

Recreation Use Stamps Easily Had

Outdoor enthusiasts should have no difficulty in finding a place to buy the new 1958 Recreation Use Stamp, reports M. O. Steen, director of the Nebraska Game Commission. Steen said the \$1 stamps are available from the 1,200 permit vendors in Nebraska, the state's 29 conservation officers, and Game Commission employees doing maintenance work on the state areas.

Only last week the Nebraska Game Commission listed the 33 different recreation grounds at which all entering vehicles are required to have the stamps. These areas are:

Wildecot Hills, Bridgeport, Walden Lake, Shell Lake, Cottonwood Lake, Champion Lake, Rock Creek Lake, Hayes Center, Wellfleet Lake, Ballard's Marsh, Long Lake, Arnold Lake, Pressey, Cottonmill Lake, Ravenna, Litchfield, Pibel Lake, Atkinson Lake, Hull Lake, Grove Lake, Hord Lake, Crystal Lake (Ayr) Alexandria, Blue River, Memphis Lake, Fremont Lakes, Dead Timber, Crystal Lake (South Sioux City), Louisville, Verdon Lake, Milburn, Lake Maloney (two areas), and Johnson Lake.

Drivers of vehicles entering the state recreation areas without the use stamp are guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$25.

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Plattsmouth At Wesleyan For Tourney

Plattsmouth is in the Nebraska Wesleyan site bracket of the Class A regional basketball play-down next spring, the Nebraska School Activities Assn. had announced. Pairings have not been determined.

Class A and AA tournaments open the week of March 3. Classes B, C, D, and E regional tournaments begin Feb. 24.

In the Wesleyan meet at Lincoln, Plattsmouth is included with Columbus, Crete, Fairbury Falls City, Lincoln Plus, Nebraska City and Seward.

Other A regionals are at Fremont, Holdrege and Ogallala. Other Cass County teams' tournament sites are:

Class C—Louisville, Nehawka and Weeping Water at Lincoln Southeast along with Cresco, Mead, Palmyra, Valparaiso and Waverly.

Class D—Eagle and Elmwood at Sprague-Martel along with Bennett, Cook, Hickman, Malcolm, Nebraska City St. Bernard and Sprague-Martel.

Class E—Avoca and Murdock at Yutan along with Kennard, Otoe, Waterloo, Walton and Yutan.

Green Light For Ice Fishermen

The ice throughout most of the state is now thick enough to support ice fishermen, reports Glen R. Foster, fisheries chief for the Nebraska Game Commission. This is later than most years, because of the unseasonable weather experienced this winter.

Foster cautions all anglers, however, to beware of thin ice. Many ice-fishing trips have ended in tragedy when the fishermen ignored the simple safety precautions of first testing the ice and wearing a life jacket.

Peak ice-fishing months in Nebraska are January and February. March begins the tapering off period.

Most fishing through the ice, according to Foster, is done in the sandhills and reservoirs, there is no reason, though, why this winter sport should not be popular elsewhere, for most all waters support some fish active during the cold of winter.

According to Donald F. LaPoint, fishery biologist for the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service, the most popular ice-fishing species are crappie, walleye, and northern pike. These fish strike as well during winter as they do in the spring and fall.

The equipment for ice fishing hardly matches the sportsman's tackle for normal fishing conditions. The only essential equipment includes hooks, sinkers, a bobber, line, fishing pole, (or ice stick as it is referred to in ice fishing circles), minnows, something with which to chop a hole through the ice and plenty of warm clothing.

As Crappie and walleye run in schools, it may be necessary to cut more than one hole in order to locate them, and once they have been located, more holes may be required so the fisherman can follow the school. This serves a two-fold purpose. It not only improves the catch, but also keeps the sportsman warm.

Age Conscious? Lucky You're Not a Bird

Pity the poor quail and pheasant! They have no secrets from the wildlife technician. They cannot even lie about their ages.

George Schildman, Nebraska Game Commission district supervisor, has built a sort of slide rule for determining bird birthdays. Give him the wing of a quail and he will tell you when that quail was born. First, he examines a certain wing feather—one of the primaries.

Then he uses the slide rule, setting a marker on a number representing the number of days before the bird was shot the feather started developing.

Then he looks at the other end of the slide rule at another marker which points to the date of the bird's birth. It is that simple.

One side of the rule is calibrated for quail, the other pheasant. But do not worry, girls, it cannot be used on people. It is strictly for the birds.

Volunteer Milo Won't Bother Much

Farmers are not likely to experience any serious trouble from volunteer grain sorghum plants in their 1958 crops.

Grain heads on the ground during the winter and early spring months are likely to be pretty well rotted by planting time in 1958, says J. C. Swinbank, Extension Agronomist at the University of Nebraska.

The possibility of volunteer grain sorghum plants in 1958 crops will be further reduced by plowing the ground before planting the 1958 crop by following grain sorghum with another planted crop such as corn, soybeans or sorghum.

Difficulty with volunteer growth may be experienced from the seed of certain tall, off-type, forage crop plants which observed in many grain sorghum fields this year, Swinbank points out.

Many of these tall, off-type plants represented crosses or mixtures of forage canes, sudan grass and Johnson grass. It is the seed of these off-type plant which may volunteer in 1958.

There are several practices farmers may follow if volunteer plants appear, Swinbank points out. They may plow the land in preparation for another crop or use close-planted grain crops & summer fallowing to gradually eliminate the undesirable cane growth.
