Too Many Suicides

We read of suicides in the papers, but unless they strike close to home, we do not give them much thought, yet approximately 22,000 people commit suicide in the United States each year, almost exactly the number of American soldiers killed in Korea in three years of war. In 1956 there were 179 suicides in Nebraska, more than three times as many as the number of deaths from tuberculosis, and far more than died from all of the other communicable diseases combined. Deaths from suicide were almost 26 times as many as those from polio. What is back of this high death rate from suicide?

Dr. Richard A. Kern of Temple University, Philadelphia, estimates that approximately 85 per cent of suicide victims have mental disturbances and nothing else. Even in the 15 per cent that have some organic disease, he feels that the mental factor enters in, for it is not so often because of cancer, for example, but because of the fear that indigestion or some other discomfort is cancer, that a person may commit suicide.

One of the large life insurance companies lists ill health as the leading cause of suicide, with 40 per cent in males and 20 per cent in females, and it says that in their suicide attempts males are successful about 50 per cent of the time and females 25 per cent.

Statistics indicate that suicides are more common among the wealthy than the poor, and business leaders and excutives are more likely to take their own lives than those of the lower classes. Rates seem to run higher in big cities.

An attempted suicide should challenge a physician rather than being considered as a nuisance, since the patient obviously needs help of some sort. Depressed persons, physically ill, and those who for some reason have lost interest in living are among the suicide types. Fear, worry, anxiety, and tension all take their toll in
