Avoca Beats Unadilla, 61-52

AVOCA — Avoca won its 13th in 19 basketball games this season here Tuesday night over Unadilla, 61-52, with a five-man scoring attack.

Schutz scored 14, Carsten and Bose 14 each, Marquardt 9 and Wohlers 8.

That accounted for all but one of the Avoca points.

Avoca won at volleyball, 12-4, 8-4, 7-11 and its grade school basketball team was a 31-21 winner.

The volleyball team has an 11-6 record, the second basketball team an 11-2 mark.

Eagle and Avoca shared the 1957-58 Cass County Basketball Conference title, final standings compiled by the Cass County Men's Assn. show.

Both had 4-1 records, Elwood was 3rd at 3-2, Nehawka 4th at 2-3 and Murdock and Alvo shared 5th with 1-4 records.

The association announced the County volleyball tournament will be at Murdock March 4, 6 and 7. Elwood Weeping Water and Avoca have been seeded favorites in that order.

First games pit Eagle vs. Louisville; Avoca vs. Alvo, Weeping Water vs. Murdock and Nehawka vs. Elwood.

Semifinals will be March 6 and consolation, third place and championship finals March 7.

The No. 1 county in new wells this year was York with 282. York also was the leader last year with 344.

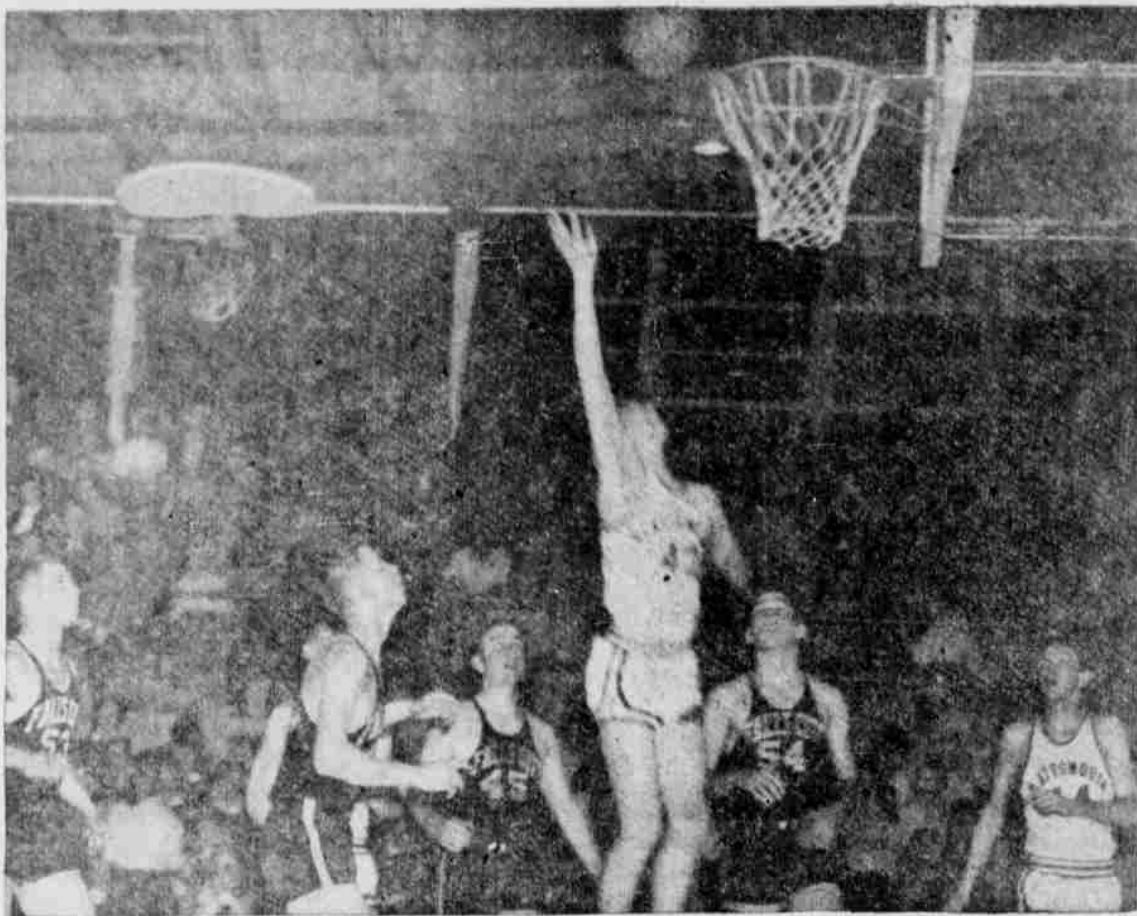

Free Coyote Hunt Being Set For County Hunters Sunday

A free coyote and fox hunt is being organized for Sunday with all Cass County hunters invited to take part.

The Plattsmouth JayCees are planning the event as a fund raising effort with Leland Meisinger in charge. There is no charge. Any money raised will be from bounties collected only.

Hunting will begin at about 12:30 p. m. and take place in the Mt. Pleasant Precinct area. Shot guns ONLY will be used.

Hunters will meet at Timm's Tavern in Murray or at the Chief Theater in Weeping Water.

Hunting will be from Murray to Weeping Water and Nehawka, generally speaking. The path of the hunt has been planned by Meisinger and he's contacted all property owners whose land the hunt will touch.

There will be no hunting north of a line running a mile north of the Murray highway, Meisinger said. Originally, it had been planned to hunt two miles north of that line but that area was deleted from the hunt. He had, however, already made some of his contacts with property holders.

Meisinger said no hunting license is required so long as participants are hunting for bounty.

Any predators bagged will be turned in by the JayCees for the bounty, \$2.50 each for a fox or coyote.
