Antelope Are Doing OK

Antelope released by the Nebraska Game Commission Jan. 26 near Bassett in Rock County are doing well, according to recent eye-witness accounts.

District Game Supervisor Jack W. Walstrom of Bassett reported that 35 of the 36 antelope imported from Colorado have been sighted and appear to be in good condition. One antelope, apparently injured in trapping, succumbed.

The fleet animals have divided into two bands. While num-

bers vary somewhat with different sightings, 16 were counted at one time in one group and 18 in another. There were unconfirmed reports of a single, lone-wolf, pronghorn sighted near Twin Lakes. Game Commission sightings were from an airplane.

The two bands were no more than 3 miles apart and were only about 1 1/2 miles from the release point, 25 miles south of Bassett.
