County Agent Warns about Corn Spoilage

A serious situation is developing with stored grain, County Agent Clarence Schmadeke says. This is the time of year when warm dry winds are needed to lower the moisture content of stored corn. The extreme opposite conditions have been prevalent. Action should be taken.

There are 3 choices farmers can make. Shell and sell now; shell, dry and store; or dry ear corn. Corn carrying 17-18 per cent moisture or above will spoil when warm weather arrives. This may mean a loss of from 50 to 75 cents per bushel.


Even if you are pretty sure your grains are safe from high moisture, it will pay to keep checking it to know what the condition of the grain is, Schmadeke says.

A simple formula for determining the amount of fertilizer to apply to your lawn has been established.

Dr. Mark Weldon, Extension agronomist and soils specialist at the College of Agriculture, says the first step is to figure the number of square yards in your lawn. Then, divide this number by the per cent of nitrogen in your fertilizer, and this answer will be the pounds of fertilizer to apply.

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
