Red Cedars Make A Good Windbreak

If you're planting a windbreak this spring and red cedar with red cedars next year.

That's the advice of Karl Loerch, extension forester at the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture. Loerch says that in a windbreak there is no substitute for red cedars capable of giving the density and compactness needed.





National Wild Life Week -- March 16-22 1958


As America's population increases, it is important that we, as citizens, insist that areas of Public Lands be set aside and managed for the recreation of the public as a whole.
