Where Did 'Bunk' Come from?

One of the most common words in the American language today is the word "bunk." We often use this term without realizing where it came from, although most of us realize what it means.

Back in 1820, the pro-slavery and the anti-slavery factions in the House of Representatives, after long and bitter argument, had reached a satisfactory compromise concerning the entry of Missouri as a State in the Union. This was accomplished through the passage of the Missouri Compromise which provided that Missouri might enter the Lnion as a slave state, but that future states formed above the line of Missouri's southern boundary should be free soil states.

All of the members of the House wanted an immediate vote, with one exception - a little-known Congressman, Felix Walker, whose principal constituency was Buncombe County, North Carolina; Walker said: "I am bound to make a speech for Buncombe" to those who asked him to allow a vote to be taken.

After that speech, every time a legislator made a useless, time-wasting talk, his colleagues would shout, "Buncombe." As time went on, the term was shortened to "bunk," and became a part of our language.

Growing to Look Alike
