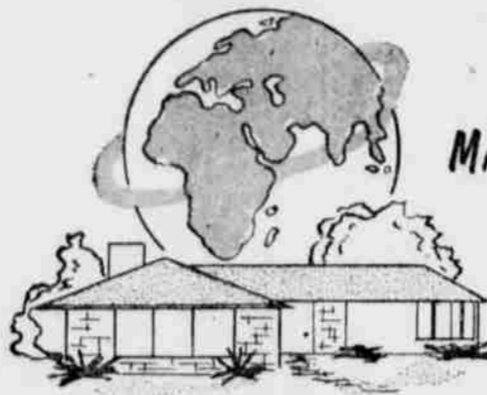

Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World

"You may doubt what you hear; you may doubt what you see; but you cannot doubt what you hear, see and do."

This is the idea which has swept the home demonstration movement around the world. Homemakers are learning by doing from the Philippines in the Far East, the Near East, through Europe, in South and Latin American countries. In the course of 50 years the home demonstration program has extended to all corners of the globe.

Home demonstration has inspired more than 6½ million of the world's women to improve their homes and family living. It has given thousands of rural women belief in themselves and their families and their communities. Farm women have been given poise, confidence and an opportunity to express themselves through these experiences.

Yesterday's rural homemaker was an isolationist of sorts. Unlike her grandmothers, she is "on the go" today. She is active in civic affairs. She attends state and nationwide meetings and her home life is as modern as her urban sister's.

Home extension club work in Nebraska has touched more than 33,000 rural and urban homes this past year. Nearly 3,000,000 adopted practices were reported—all as a result of teaching through clubs and home extension agents in Nebraska's counties.

The basic goal of home extension club work is to strengthen home and family life by helping women become more efficient homemakers. This goal is reached by giving them the latest in home economics subject

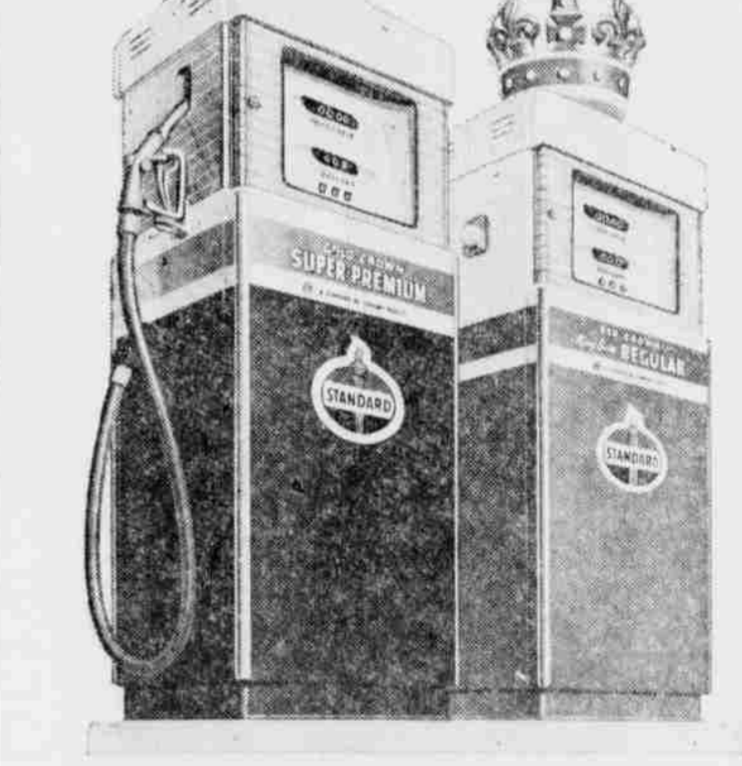
