lars forced open a window after removing a bar across the window. Sherriff Tom Solomon was notified an hour after the incident and he and deputy Wayne Schneider then went to Louisville to assist in the search. The Sarpy County sheriff also was called.

Inasmuch as no witnesses heard any car leave the scene following the shot, it is a possibility, according to Solomon, the "lone burglar" was a resident or transit laborer in the Louisville area.

Articles dropped by the burglar are being sent to the State Criminal Bureau at Lincoln by the sheriff's office for search of fingerprints, Solomon said,
