HUNTSVILLE, Ala. — Pfc. Dale E. Hild of Louisville, Neb., assisted in the launching of the army's Redstone Missile at Cape Canaveral, Fla., the army announced today. This marked the first time that a large ballistic missile has been fired by a team of U. S. military personnel.

The launching of the 62-foot missile marked the completion of one year of extensive training of Hild's unit, the 40th Field Artillery Missile Group. The training was conducted by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency at the Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Ala.

Hild, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest A. Hild, is a rocket launcher crewman in Battery B of the group's 217th Field Artillery Battalion at Redstone Arsenal. He entered the army in June, 1937, and received basic train-

ing at Fort Dix, N. J.

The 22-year-old soldier is a 1933 graduate of Plattsmouth High School.
