"The statutes do not, however, have the same effect in proceedings before a city council or before the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission and a finding of guilty by either the city councll or the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission does not and will not have any effect upon the licensee to obtain a renewal.

"Thus, if your city council concludes that it can and should take some action against the licensee, the right of the licensee to obtaining a renewal will not be effected unless the council revokes the license."
