The Real War

The real war between Russia and the United States, already in progress, is an economic war.

When Khrushchev first uttered these words, some years ago, Americans laughed in his face.

Today, however, with the recession in progress, and with Russian economic progress making impressive gains, while our industrial productivity steadily drops,

In recent weeks and months the Russians have moved into the aluminum, tin, platinum, and zinc markets.

This is apparently the latest move in Khrushchev's attempt to make good his boast that he will take the world market away from the United States.

A few days after the Canadian supplier cut the price of aluminum, American producers were forced to cut their prices also.

In addition to these developments it is reported by the United Nations in New York that Russia is entering the field as an exporter of tin in another major move to compete in the field of world trade.

All of this does not mean that U. S. exporters should throw up their hands and surrender. It does mean, however, that the Russian economic threat is real, that this country cannot afford a recession which reduces the productivity of its industrial output and that — if necessary — government action may eventually have to be taken to insure U. S. survival and well-being in the battle for world trade.

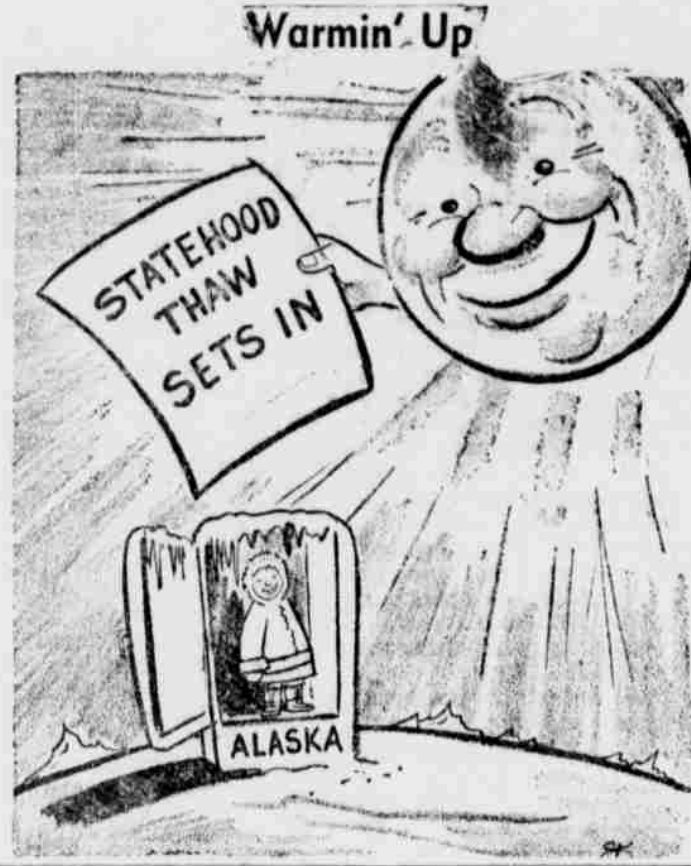
Down Memory Lane

Permission granted, subject to clearance of the Fire Chief, to Junior Chamber of Commerce to use 5th St. from Ave. A to Main St. and Main St. to alley south of Main St. for carnival purposes on July 22nd and 23rd.
