### Representative From County at TB Assn. Meeting

Mrs. LaVell K. Swarts of Eagle attended the 51st Annual Meeting of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association held at Sheraton-Fontenelle Hotel, Omaha, June 11-12.

Mrs. Swarts is county representative director for Cass County.

Highlight of the Convention was a talk by Katharine R. Boucot, M. D., Philadelphia, Pa., supervisor of Chest X-ray Surveys there. She stressed that Chest X-rays are still in good use — that radiation is very small being equal to that radiation one would receive from wearing a luminous dial wrist watch for a year.

Men over 45 are to be urged to have an X-ray once or twice a year, she said, as they are most susceptible to TB, and to other lung diseases, also lung cancer. While tuberculosis can be controlled, people are reluctant to avail themselves of this service and our death rate for tuberculosis is not being lowered as rapidly as it should be, she said.
