Rock Island Has Derailment At South Bend Bridge — Sixteen cars on a Rock Island freight train jammed together in a mass of wreckage Friday just as the train was clearing the bridge at South Bend.

The train, an extra going east, was hauling small grain in all but a few of its 30 to 40 cars. The last of the train had not cleared the bridge when the box and flat cars jammed together and pitched down both sides of the right-of-way.
