CANCER 'BULLETS'
Albany, Ore. — Cancer - fight-ing radioactive "bullets" have been developed by Bureau of Mines scientists.

The "bullets" designed to be either "shot" or implanted into cancerous tissue, are actually small metal cylinders cut from fine strands of high-purity chromium wire produced only at the Bureau's Northwest Elec-trodevelopment Laboratory. They measure a tenth of an inch in length and are a thirtieth of an inch in diameter.

The "chromium bullets" are exposed to neutrons in a nuclear reactor and made radioactive so they emit gamma rays in the manner of radium.
