Heat I cup milh and 1/2 cream; add oyster liquid. Blend 2 Tbsp. melted butter with 3 Thep flour. Stir in hot liquid and cook (stirring often) till thick and smooth. Add 1/2 cup catsup, I tsp. worcestershire sauce, 4 tsp. salt and 1/8 tsp. paprika. Add one small can crab meat and the scalded oysters. Serve hot on but-tered toost or toosted crackers.

Ocops . . . Dropped me Chop! Cold water should be used to sponge away egg or meat spots from clothing, right away before the garment's laundered. If any stain stays after washing,
