Plattsmouth Family Tells Of Trip to Europe 'Congress'

(Editor's note: Mrs. Robert Reade and Bob of Plattsmouth this summer attended the International Congress on Modern Treatment of Deafness at Manchester, England. Following is an account of their trip with Mr. Reade.)

They are back home in Plattsmouth now but the Robert Reades are still feeling the glow of their 7½-week trip to 12 European countries.

They drove 4,000 miles by car on the Continent besides their ship, railroad, bus and plane travel.

They sailed for Europe on the "Italia M.S." and returned on the "Hanseatic" from Cuxhaven, Germany. In between those sailings were nearly two months of sightseeing, plus the important visit to the Congress in Manchester.

The Reades stopped off at Plymouth, England, first, then toured England, Wales and Ireland. They flew from Dublin to Manchester.

Highlight of the Congress, they say, was demonstration of the vibration method of treatment for deafness. It shows the relationship between musical training and language and speech for deaf children.

Children used in the demonstration were from Holland and were from 11 to 18 years old. The Reades watched them "listen" and watch telling of a story about a poem. She read the poem rhythmically and the children followed the movements of her hands. The new vocabulary was developed.

Then the children composed music for the poem. They acted out the poem and gave an interpretative dance.

An added thrill in connection with the Congress for Mrs. Reade and Bob was a visit with the Lord Mayor of London. They were among 1,500 Congress members who visited the Mayor and his Council.

The Reades struck up a conversation with the Lord Mayor though they didn't know it was he for he was in civil dress. The thrill came when they found out who he was.

Mr. Reade joined the family in London (which is near his birthplace, Beivedere, Kent).

The Reades then visited their daughter and family in Frankfurt, Germany, and their tour of the Continent by car followed.

They found: Germany's fields "well cared for and beautiful"; Switzerland "beautiful and its people so industrious, peaceful and happy";

In Austria, they were "cognizant of being in the old world." The Dolomite Mountains in Italy "majestic and rugged much
