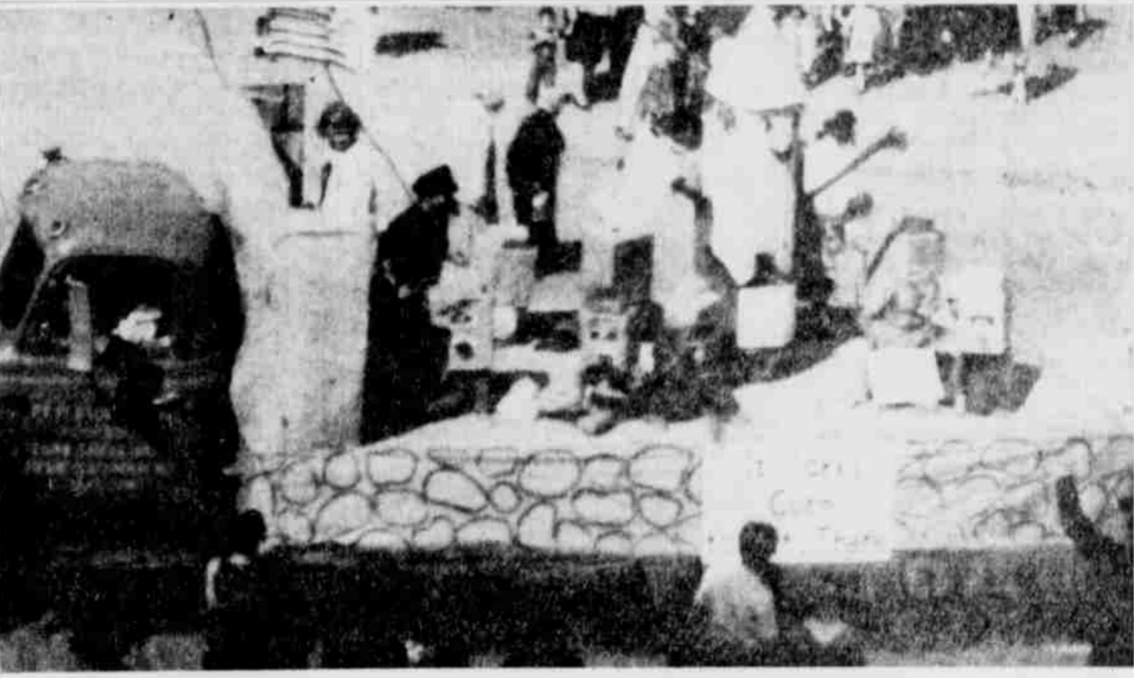

Hessian Fly-Safe Date
Infestations of Hessian Fly are greater this year than during the past 5 years. In moist cool seasons, destructive populations can build up in a remarkably short time. The damage suffered is two-fold; young plants are affected in the late fall and early winter; and further loss occurs just before harvest in the late spring and early summer.
Hessian fly can be controlled effectively. Controls are: 1. Plant resistant varieties such as Ponea and Pawnee. 2. Destroy by discing, all volunteer wheat that comes up before the fly-safe date. 3. Plow infested stubble early to bury the flax seeds. 4. Plant after the fly-safe date. The average fly-safe dates for Cass County are September 27 for the northern and western parts of the county and September 28 for the southern and eastern parts of the county.
