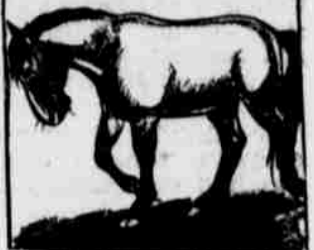
In other past years, Cass county percentages of death from heart causes and numbers of heart death were: 1953, 51% (94); 1954, 53% (87); 1955, 61% (110).

This year, Cass County raised \$2,225 for the Heart Fund Drive. The goal was \$2,214. Dr. L. S. Pucelik of Plattsmouth was county chairman and each city or town had an individual chairman or sponsoring organization.

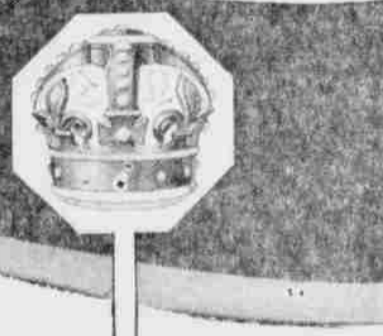
