Eight-Year-Old Killer?

It is hard to believe that an eightyear-old boy planned and executed a brutal murder of both his parents. Yet that is what the news stories are telling us, and there seems little possiblilty that it is not the truth.

Certainly this must represent the trend of the times, with juvenile delinquincy rampart and reaching record level, involving murder, and murder of one's parents, it is time for Americans to sit up and take notice.

Suspected as a contributing factor even if mental abnormality is to be blamed as the real cause - is the overdose of murder, neurotic inclined criminals and vice and corruption which is beamed over the television waves almost constantly.

Young people are, of course, highly impressionable,, and they see more of this business then they should. It is designed, and bought by the advertisers, to be a diversion for adults, but for the young, who have not yet reached the stage in life where judgement and restraint have matured, it can be a fatal influence.

The movies originally put over drinking as the social "thing" among many women and many of our youngsters. But the movies couldn't come into the home, and the very young, in most cases, didn't see the type of thing that's available in most homes every night these days.

Where are the inspirational, sensible, clean, quiet, truthful and informative presentations designed for family viewing? Where are the good clean adventure stores, stressing character and the right things in life, for the red-blooded boy and girl (other than the usual deluge of cowboy offerings, some of which are very good, but most of which feature wholesale shootings and killings)?

These are questions Mr. and Mrs. TV viewer and the television industry and sponsors should be thinking about. It's quite possible that today's steady diet of crime fare is responsible for some of our juvenile crime, and even for the loss of some lives!


