There being no further business the minutes were read and approved and a motion to adjourn carried.

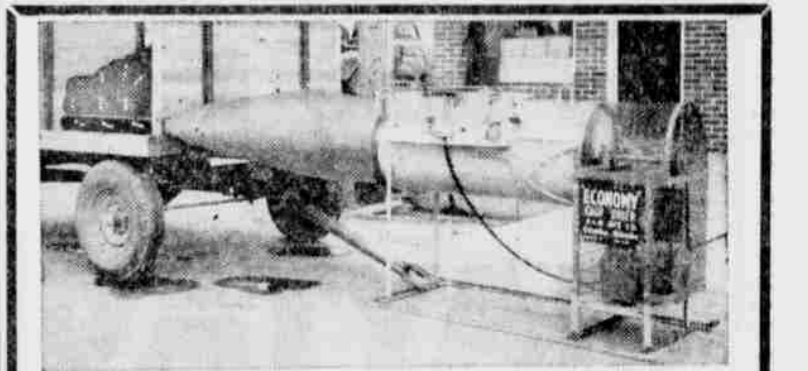
