It is the month in which Columbus landed in America, on October 12, 1492. The cornerstone of the White House was laid on October 13th, 1792. A prize of \$500 had been offered for a design for the White House and James Hoban, an architect from Charleston, South Carolina, won the prize. Of more current interest, October 14th

is the birthday of President Eisenhower and the month also contains the birthday anniversaries of several ex-Presidents, among them being John Adams, the second President of the United States, whose birthday falls on October 19, Chester Arthur, the 21st President of the United States, who was born October 4th.

Hallowe'en, which falls on the last day of the month, had its beginning long before the dawn of the Christian Era. Today. Hallowe'en is not a mysterious, mystic observance, and has little religious significance.

The custom of wearing robes and masks on Hallowe'en originated in early times when it was thought that witches and ghosts were most likely to wander about on that night. This is part of the mystic atmosphere which surrounded Hallowe'en among the early people, including the Druids, who also thought the lord of death called together the souls of the wicked at Hallowe'en and condemned them to inhabit the bodies of animals.
