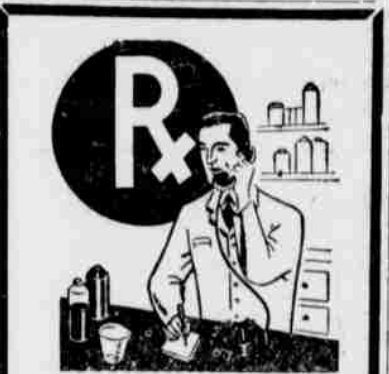
Mrs. Maycroft Writes From Portland, Oregon
